What do they do?

A childminder is a person who works with children for more than 2 hours a day in their own home for reward. In England, childminders are registered with Ofsted. Registration with the governing body means childminders attain a certain level of skills, knowledge and competency to fulfil their many roles. Legal requirements for childminders - all childminders must carry public liability insurance and class 1 business insurance to drive with childminded children in their cars. They must have completed an introductory training course and update paediatric first aid training every 3 years. All childminders in England must comply with the requirements of the EYFS 2012 and Childcare Register 2012, local planning, fire and food hygiene laws, health and safety legislation and the Equality Act 2010.

Skills required

The skills and personal qualities needed include:

- Excellent communication skills
- The ability to engage with young children
- Record keeping skills
- Maths skills, to do simple financial calculations

How to become a childminder

CHILDMINDER

To become a childminder in Manchester look on the Manchester City Council website <u>www.manchester.gov.uk</u> (If you live in another Authority eg Stockport, look on their website.)

Anyone in who looks after one or more children under the age of 8 years in to whom they are not related, on domestic premises, for reward and for a total of more than two hours in any day must register as a childminder.

As a registered childminder you will:

- Offer the children you care for a happy and inspirational home-based professional care and learning environment.
- See the children that you care for grow and develop and care for your own children at the same time, if you have a family.
- Work in your home, choosing the hours you work and the services you provide in a career where no two days are the same.
- Meet other childcare professionals in your area and get to know your local community, joining many thousands of childminders providing high-quality professional childcare and early education

Information about the types of childcare that are exempt from registration in England is available <u>from Ofsted</u>.

NURSERY ASSISTANT

You might start out as a student or nursery assistant whilst you work towards your level 2 qualification. Some nurseries may offer the opportunity to complete an <u>apprenticeship</u> and this can be a great first step.

A nursery must ensure that all staff receives induction training to help them understand their roles and responsibilities. When you start work at a nursery your training will include information about emergency evacuation procedures, safeguarding, child protection, the nursery's equal opportunities policy and health and safety issues.

Skills required

You'll need:

- sensitivity and understanding
- patience and the ability to remain calm in stressful situations
- the ability to work well with others
- to be flexible and open to change
- the ability to accept criticism and work well under pressure
- excellent verbal communication skills
- customer service skills
- thinking and reasoning skills
- able to use a computer terminal or hand-held device may be beneficial for this job.

A Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check is essential to work as a nursery assistant or childminder.
